

# Frederick John Mills

1189, Hunts Cyclist Bn: 43067, 2<sup>nd</sup> Bn. Bedfordshire Regiment: DOW 3<sup>rd</sup> May 1918 aged 22

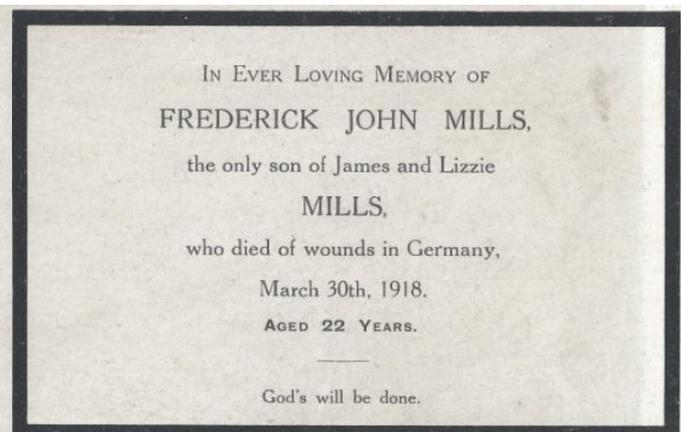
Frederick was born in 1896 in Abbots Ripton the only son of James and Elizabeth (nee Peach) Mills. He was known as Jack. James was a shepherd and Jack also worked on a farm. Along with his parents and 2 younger sisters Jack came to live in Ramsey Road, Warboys.



Jack was one of a number of local men who enlisted in the Hunts Cyclists Battalion which had a hall in Warboys. This Battalion served on the home front patrolling the East Coast to repel any German invasion. In August 1916 he made a Soldier's Will leaving all property and effects to "my dear mother". He transferred to the Bedfordshire Regiment and was sent to France. He was injured earlier in the war and again during the German Spring Offensive of 1918. He was posted as missing on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 1918 and presumably taken prisoner as he is recorded by the Germans as having died in their military hospital at Bohain on the 3<sup>rd</sup> May 1918. They buried him in Bohain Cemetery. After the war his body was found by the British, identified by a cross on the grave and "paper found in bottle" in the grave and reburied in Premont British Cemetery.

The Battalion war diary records that during the Battle of St. Quentin, on 22<sup>nd</sup> March, the enemy attacked in large numbers and some prisoners were taken. They surrounded B Company (to which Jack belonged) and only a few got back. The Battalion withdrew but there were a number of casualties from machine gun and shrapnel fire.

The family believed that Jack died on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1918.



His family continued to live in Warboys his father dying in 1922 and his mother in 1925. His sisters added Jack's name to their parents' gravestone in Warboys Church Cemetery. This is Jack's younger sister Sarah, known as Tiny, standing by the grave.
